I am pleased to present the 2024–2025 Annual Report of the Hume Region Palliative Care Consortium (HPCC), showcasing the achievements and initiatives that have shaped the past year.

#### 2024-2025 Highlights:

- Palliative Care in Aged Care Summit, featuring keynote speaker Dr Jo Doran, a pre-eminent palliative care physician from Gold Coast Hospital.
- New education and workforce initiatives:
  - Subsidies for novice palliative care nurses to complete the Eastern Palliative Care Foundations Course
  - A Hume Palliative Care Masterclass, hosted by GV Hospice and led by local physicians and a nurse practitioner
- Improved regional data capability
  - All six community palliative care services now submit data to the Palliative Care Outcomes Collaborative (PCOC), enabling comprehensive regional reporting
- Continued collaboration and funding support from Murray PHN to strengthen service innovation and integration

In addition to these initiatives, HPCC implemented its top regional priority for the year: commissioning an external review of palliative care consultancy services. This review is a critical step in shaping future models of care.

### **Our Region**



The Hume Palliative Care Consortium covers the Hume Region, in north eastern Victoria. Hume extends from Melbourne's northern growth corridor through to the NSW border. Shepparton and Wodonga are the two largest population centres in the region. Hume is characterised by Victoria's High Country to the east and the Goulburn Valley to the south/west of the region, containing one of Australia's largest and most productive food bowls.

# **Ageing Population & Growing Demand**



Meeting the needs of a rapidly ageing population remains the most pressing challenge for the palliative care sector. As the large 'baby boomer' generation moves into older age, the demand for end-of-life care will increase substantially. By 2051, around 2 million Victorians are projected to be aged 65 years or older—double today's number. The number of Victorians aged 85 years and over is expected to almost triple to 400,000 people.

For the Hume region, projections show similar trends: the 65+ population is expected to grow significantly, and the number of residents aged 85+ will more than double by 2051, highlighting the growing local demand for palliative care services.

## PALLIATIVE CARE DEMAND - AIHW SNAPSHOT 2021-22

The Australian Institue of Health and Welfare (AIHW) data is a set of national statistics that track how Australians access and use palliative care services. The most recent update covers data up to 2021 - 2022 and shows continuing growth in both inpatient and community palliative care demand.

#### Inpatient:

- 94,700 hospitalisations (+29% increase since 2015-16)
- Nearly **800,000 bed-days**
- Median stay 10.5 days (vs 2.6 days for all hospitalisations)

#### Community:

- Over 81,000 clients (+21% since 2015-16)
- 3.1 million service contacts (+16%)

### **Our Services**




People living with a life-limiting illness will need to have palliative care provided in many different settings in the Hume Region. Specialist palliative care services can provide services directly to people living with a life-limiting illness or provide consultancy services to other health professionals. These services are structured to allow other health professionals to obtain expert advice.

There are six funded specialist community palliative care services in Hume which cover one or more local government areas. The region is also supported by two palliative care consultancy services and St Vincent's Hospital Melbourne palliative care physicians.


# Our Services PCOC Update



The Palliative Care Outcomes Collaboration (PCOC) is a national benchmarking program, funded by the Department of Health and Aged Care, that measures the quality and outcomes of palliative care across Australia. Participation is voluntary and provides services with valuable insights to continually improve patient and family care.

This year, the HPCC Clinical Advisory
Group achieved a key priority with all six
specialist community palliative care
services now reporting data to the
Palliative Care Outcomes Collaboration
(PCOC). While some services have been
submitting data for many years, others
are newer to PCOC, with some
commencing reporting for the first time
in 2025. All services, together with HPCC,
have consented to a regional PCOC
report, which we look forward to
receiving for the January–June 2025
period.



GV Hospice achieved national recognition for excellence in 2024, meeting all 20 benchmarks in the Palliative Care Outcomes Collaboration (PCOC) Report over a 12month period. This sustained commitment to quality has driven continuous improvement, including a project that streamlined clinical handovers to 5-10 minutes for 150 clients, enabling timely interventions for those in unstable, terminal and deteriorating phases.

Our work is undertaken using three HPCC strategic priorities: Building Capacity, Innovative Models of Care and Engaged Consumers, Carers and Communities. Our strategic framework supports the Victorian Department of Health's 'Palliative Care End of Life Framework' and 2024-2028 strategic directions.



#### HPCC 2024 Palliative Care in Aged Care Summit

The Summit held on 7<sup>th</sup> November 2024 was a true highlight, proudly delivered in partnership with our valued supporters, Murray PHN.

This year's Summit welcomed pre-eminent palliative care physician Dr Jo Doran from Gold Coast Hospital as keynote speaker. Jo delivered an engaging presentation on communication skills in palliative care — a topic selected in direct response to participant feedback from the 2023 Summit.

The event was our biggest and best yet, attracting 95 in-person participants from across the Hume region plus online participants from further afield.

#### Highlights included:

- Inspiring keynote presentation by Dr Jo Doran
- Panel discussions and case studies
- The arts including a lively hypothetical and music that engaged the whole audience
- A special GP breakfast session delivered by Dr Doran ahead of the Summit

The 2024 Summit strengthened connections across aged care, primary care, and specialist palliative care – reaffirming HPCC's commitment to advancing palliative and end-of-life care across the Hume region.






#### **Early Referral Audit**

In partnership with Monash University, HPCC undertook a study examining declined referrals to specialist palliative care in rural settings. The research explored reasons why some patients referred do not access services, providing important insights to strengthen referral pathways and equity of care. A poster showcasing the study was accepted and presented at the 2025 Oceanic Palliative Care Conference, highlighting HPCC's contribution to advancing rural palliative care research on a national stage.

#### **PalCareGo**

In 2024–25, HPCC funded a trial of PalCareGo, a mobile telehealth module integrated with the PalCare patient record system, across all community palliative care services in the Hume region. Initiated by the HPCC Clinical Advisory Group, the project has enabled clinicians to access and update patient records in real time and provide virtual consultations. Early feedback shows improved efficiency, coordination, and flexibility of care for patients and families, with findings to guide future digital innovation.





### Inaugural Palliative Care Masterclass

Hume Palliative Care Consortium palliative care physicians and a nurse practitioner, co-facilitated a simulation based Palliative Care Physical Assessment Masterclass on the 27th February 2025. The Masterclass was attended by 18 experienced palliative care clinicians from across the region. Three medical students from The University of Melbourne Rural Clinical School generously volunteered as 'patients' in the simulations conducted throughout the day. This initiative was organised through the HPCC Clinical Advisory Group and feedback from participants has been overwhelmingly positive.



# Residential Aged Care Imprest Project

In partnership with Murray PHN, HPCC community palliative care teams implemented a residential aged care Imprest project. The project developed and delivered an evidence-based syringe driver education and competency assessment package across aged care homes in the Hume region. Around 100 nursing staff completed training on recognising deterioration and administering subcutaneous medications at end of life. A small number of homes also accessed funding to establish a medicines imprest or purchase a syringe driver,





### EPC Foundations - A Valued Partnership

This year, HPCC funded two subsidies for Hume specialist palliative care clinicians to enrol in the Eastern Palliative Care Foundations Course, which supports novice nurses and allied health staff to transition to advanced beginner practice in specialist palliative care.
